**Bentonville Parks and Recreation
Advisory Board Meeting
February 27, 2017**

The Bentonville Parks and Recreation Advisory Board met January 23, 2017 at the Downtown Activity Center.

Present were members Holly Hook, Michelle Malashock, Courtney Schaffer, Craig Gilbert, Mike Power, Jon Terlouw, Shara Fisher, Amy Davis and Tom Butrynski. David Wright, Lee Farmer, Angel Stuler and Crant Osborne were present for the staff. Guests included Jeremy Brown and Fred Bonci of LaQuatra Bonci Associates, Inc.

Meeting began at 5:02PM

Old Business

1. Approval of Minutes from December meeting
 - Motion to approve by Butrynski
 - Hook seconded the motion
 - Approved 8-0

New Business

1. . Introduction of new Members – Michelle Malashock and Craig Gilbert
 - Wright recognized both Malashock and Gilbert as the new 2017 PRAB members. Both Malashock and Gilbert gave a brief introduction of themselves.
2. Election of Officers
 - Both Fisher and Power nominated Terlow for PRAB Chairman. PRAB approved Terlow for Chairman 9-0.
3. 30% Progress Presentation of Master Plan
 - Jeremy Brown and Fred Bonci of LaQuatra Bonci Associates gave a presentation of their work so far for the new Bentonville Parks and Recreation 10 Year Master Plan. They're about 30% into the plan. Bonci and Brown told PRAB after visiting with multiple groups and gathering public input, the 3 most important items from the public included:
 1. Trails Connectivity
 2. Public Amenities – West of Walton
 3. Neighborhood ParksBrown and Bonci included a presentation with their design and ideas thus far. Seamless connectivity (trails and parks) is an important factor in the design. Other items included in the design are: conservation (natural topography), mapped watersheds (building on natural systems), loop trail (continuous trail connectivity – including through existing parks and other proposed areas), possible

destinations for parks, branding, specific recommendations for public parks/green spaces in new developments, all inclusive center (tweaking site plan area of current recreation center), indoor sports complex, and neighborhood parks. Hook asked about the progression over the next 10 years. Bochi said Parks and Recreation will prioritize, but will need to be opportunistic.

Other Business

- Wright updated PRAB on the current projects. Wright said the Melvin Ford Aquatic Center updates are currently under construction and the contract states they will be done by April 1st. Wright told PRAB the 2016-2017 ice rink season was the best season we've ever had. When asked about the Bella Vista Dam, Wright told PRAB we are proceeding. Every community is different, we will do what's best for the community.

Narrative (describe the inspiration for the artwork and how it contributes to the visitor's experience)

Bentonville Public Library (BPL) proposes to install a StoryWalk® in Train Station Park at 402 South Main Street. This engaging installation is a lovely way for park visitors of all ages to enjoy reading while outdoors! Our proposal is modeled from the StoryWalk® Project that was created by Anne Ferguson of Montpelier, VT and developed in collaboration with the Kellogg Hubbard Library. We believe the project is a perfect fit for our intended location, and is directly in-line with Bentonville Library's mission to engage our community, encourage discovery and promote literacy by offering lifelong learning opportunities.

The StoryWalk® project consists of laminated pages from a children's picture book that are affixed to pedestals installed along an outdoor path. Children's books will be selected with our family-oriented community in mind; BPL plans to rotate book content two times per year. We are developing our project in collaboration

with the Scott Family Amazeum to facilitate sharing books and coordinate a successful StoryWalk® for library and museum visitors.

Our permanent pedestals will be created with quality, maintenance and location in mind. Eighteen (18) pedestals for BPL's StoryWalk® project will be designed, built and installed in-ground at Train Station Park. A progressive configuration will reveal the story, fostering exploration and discovery in a natural setting. The cost of all materials will be determined after consulting partner organizations and potential sponsors; the library's operating budget will absorb minimal StoryWalk® expenses. One of the panels will include appropriate credits and acknowledgements about the StoryWalk® project.

Train Station Park is directly across Main Street from the library and is owned by the Bentonville Library Foundation. The Executive Committee of the foundation's Board of Directors approves and supports the StoryWalk® project. The property is maintained by the City of Bentonville's Parks and Recreation Department. BPL staff will work with the Parks & Rec team to ensure appropriate materials and installation plans for the StoryWalk® will meet ongoing maintenance requirements. BPL is also partnering with the Bentonville High School Ignite Program to work with construction-tract students for CAD design and installation experience.

Our Library Advisory Board supports the project; members are especially excited about plans to unveil our first StoryWalk® in conjunction with Bentonville's Third Annual Youth Literature Festival scheduled for April 29, 2017. BPL's debut StoryWalk® book is 'One Dog Canoe' by Mary Casanova, illustrated by Bentonville's own, Ard Hoyt (both Casanova and Hoyt are participating in this year's festival).

We anticipate that BPL's StoryWalk® at Train Station Park will enrich our community by inviting and engaging visitors to the area, promote our city's cultural values and encourage appreciation for the written word and art illustrations in children's literature. Because the park is located in Bentonville's Art District, it is the natural choice for Bentonville Public Library's StoryWalk.® Thank you for considering this opportunity to celebrate literacy and creativity at Train Station Park.

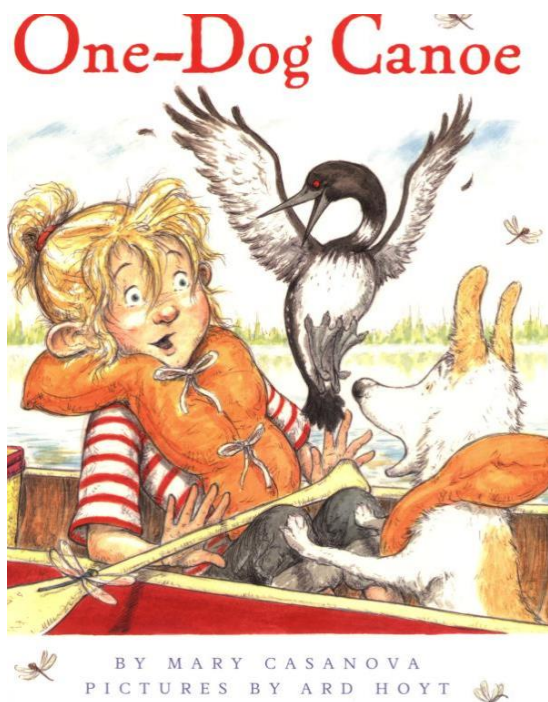


Approximate Dimensions of Eighteen (18) StoryWalk® Pedestals

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL**Sec. 62-1. Parks advisory board.**

(1) *Generally* The parks and recreation advisory board (board) shall act in an advisory capacity to the City of Bentonville Mayor and City Council on all policy matters pertaining to parks and recreation activities. Board members are to work in the public interest and speak for the general community in matters regarding parks and recreation. It is the duty of the board members to promote and foster community involvement in parks and recreation activities. The board shall stimulate and encourage communication with members of the community to ensure that programs, goals and objectives are consistent with community needs and desires. The board should focus a positive public attention on the parks and recreation systems. The board shall function in accordance with the policies and procedures established herein.

(2) *Composition.* The board shall be composed of nine members. All members (excluding ex officio members) shall be qualified electors of the city.

(a) Ex officio members may include a member of the city council, the director of parks and recreation, the president of the Bentonville Advertising and Promotion Commission, a member of the Bentonville Community Development Department, a member of the Bentonville Police Department, and a representative of the Bentonville School District.

(b) The board may create standing subcommittees, as needed, to address specific matters.

(3) *Terms of office.* Board members shall be appointed by the city council in accordance with the following:

(a) Members of the board shall serve for terms of three years.

(b) No board member shall be eligible to serve more than two terms (full or partial) in succession.

(4) *Removal.* Any board member appointed by the city council may be removed at any time by a majority of the elected members of the city council. The mayor may also remove from office any board member upon approval by the city council.

(5) *Officers.* At the first meeting following the appointment of members, the board shall elect from among its membership a chair, vice-chair, and secretary. The officers shall serve two-year terms. No member shall serve more than two consecutive two-year terms as chairperson without interruption of at least a two-year period.

(a) The chairperson is the principal officer and will preside at all meetings and shall rule on all matters of procedure regarding the order of business, motion, voting, etc. He or she shall appoint the necessary committees to establish the goals and meet the objectives of the board. The chairperson shall have a vote in all matters of business.

(b) The vice-chairperson will serve in the same capacity as the chairman in the event the chairman is absent or in the event of his or her inability or refusal to act.

(7) *Meetings.*

- (a) The board shall meet once each month, at a location in the City of Bentonville designated by the board.
- (b) Special meetings may be called by the chairman or any three of the board members at any time after 24 hours' prior written notice designating the time and place of such meeting.
- (c) All requirements of the laws of the State of Arkansas concerning open meetings and notice shall be met.
- (d) A quorum shall consist of any five board members. All actions of the board shall be upon a vote of not less than a majority of the members present. All board members except the ex officio member shall be entitled to vote upon all matters.
- (e) Any member of the PRAB who misses three consecutive regular meetings, or a total of six meetings in a one-year period, except in extraordinary cases, shall immediately tender his/her resignation and that position shall become vacant.

(8) *Authority of the board.* All decisions of such board are subject to final consideration by the city council or mayor as appropriate or required by resolution, ordinance or statute. Provided, however, it is the intention of the city council that all items within the scope of authority of the board be submitted to the board for consideration and recommendation prior to submission to the city council for those matters which require council action. The mayor is authorized to provide available staff to assist the board, as approved through city budget and expenditure processes.

(9) *Limitations of authority.* The authority of the board is expressly limited to the specific responsibilities and duties contained herein and nothing herein shall be construed or interpreted to:

- (a) Grant the board authority over the operation of any department, division, office, officer, or employee of the city except as may be requested by the mayor or city council in special circumstances.
- (b) Diminish the responsibility of the mayor in resolving conflicts which may arise over what specific items may be within the scope of authority of the board.
- (c) Diminish the authority of the city council over funding, operations, fixed assets, indebtedness, budget, and other areas as applicable under Arkansas law.
- (d) Create a commission under any state law regarding the creation of autonomous committees or commissions.

No person shall bring alcoholic beverages into a park, nor shall any person drink alcoholic beverages at any time in a park.

Sec. 62-27. Fireworks and explosives.

No person shall bring into a park, or have in his possession, or set off or otherwise cause to explode in a park, any firecrackers, torpedoes, rockets or other fireworks or explosives, or discharge them or throw them into any park area from land or a highway adjacent thereto. This section shall not apply to fireworks displays lawfully authorized by the fire official pursuant to this Code.

Sec. 62-28. Building of fires.

No person shall build or attempt to build a fire in a park except in such areas and under such regulations as may be designated by the director in accordance with uniform city standards.

No person, except a law enforcement officer, pursuant to his duties, shall have in his possession in any park or recreation area any pistol, revolver, rifle, shotgun, BB gun, airgun, spring gun, slingshot, blowgun or other similar weapon.

Sec. 62-30. Merchandising.

No person shall expose or offer for sale in a park any article or thing. Exception is here made as to any regularly contracted concessionaire acting by and under the authority and regulation of the director in accordance with uniform city standards.

, Sec. 62-31. Dogs.

No person shall cause or permit any dog owned by him or under his control or custody to enter any park where a sign is posted bearing the legend "No Dogs Allowed," or other words to that effect. In park areas where dogs are permitted, all such dogs shall at all times be kept under reasonable control by means of a leash unless in an area designated by the city as a "dog run." This section shall not apply to any dog which is used as a guide dog for a blind person,

ARTICLE III. BENTONVILLE LAKE**Sec. 62-59. Enforcement.**

All regulations of the state game and fish commission pertaining to the Bentonville Lake shall be fully enforceable by law enforcement officers of the city.

- (1) Swimming, bathing, water skiing, aquaplaning, operation of any boat, craft, vessel or personal watercraft including jet skis, wave jammers, wet bikes, water skis, aquaplanes.
- (2) Open fires (except in barbecue pots provided by the city), littering, dumping of any refuse or trash, possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages or opened alcoholic beverage containers, overnight camping, or tenting.
- (3) Firearms and explosives and any operation of motor or motorized vehicles off the access road around the lake.
- (4) Any fishing other than bank fishing.
- (5) Any violation of state game and fish commission regulations.

The possession of any hunting, fishing and tenting equipment or alcoholic beverage or containers thereof or any other items whose use is prohibited by this article or by regulations of the state game and fish commission shall be considered prima facie evidence that the possessor is engaged in the use of such equipment or items.

Sec. 62-63. Legal remedies.

The city is specifically authorized to seek civil and criminal monetary restitution for damage or destruction of facilities or property at the Bentonville Lake and the surrounding lands.

Ordinance Review – February 27, 2017**

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL.

No action needed

ARTICLE II. USE OF PARK PROPERTY

Sec. 62-31. Dogs.

- (a) No person shall cause or permit any dog owned by him or under his control or custody to enter any park where a sign is posted bearing the legend “No Dogs Allowed,” or other words to that effect. In parks areas where dogs are permitted, all such dogs shall at all times be kept under reasonable control by means of a leash unless in an area designate by the city as a “dog run” *or “dog park”*. This section shall not apply to any dog which is used as a guide dog for a blind person, to a signal dog for a deaf, or hard of hearing person, or to a service dog for a physically handicapped person. This section shall not apply to dogs used for law enforcement purposes by authorized officials.

Description:

- (a) Adding the term “dog park”, therefore allowing dogs to be off their leash while using a park designated for dogs.

New Section

Sec. __. Volunteer Screening for Youth Sports Programs in Bentonville Public Parks

Section 1. Sports volunteer background screening policy:

Sports Volunteer Background Screening Policy.

- A) The City of Bentonville operates numerous recreational facilities in which volunteers and sports organizations play a prominent role. The City Council wishes to protect the youth of the city who are participants in youth sports programs and organizations sponsored or funded by the city or any youth sports organization using a city facility.
- B) The policy set forth within this section shall apply to all volunteers, promoters, board members and paid employees who may be in direct contact with youth sports participants for any youth sport organization sponsored or funded by the city or any youth sports organization using a city facility. Such volunteers must pass a Level 2 Background Check.
- C) All youth sport organizations are required to have all adult volunteers complete a youth sports volunteer form authorized by the Parks and Recreation Director including the payment of a fee to cover costs of the background screening process.
- D) The City shall utilize a qualified entity to undertake the background screening. The criteria set forth above shall be applied to the background screening entity. The background screening entity shall undertake the background screening and provide the results to the city. The results shall be simply a statement of whether the specific adult volunteer satisfies the criteria or shall be excluded by failing to satisfy the criteria set forth above.
- E) The city hereby adopts the standards of the National Recreation and Park Association Guidelines for Credentialing Volunteers. The following are criteria for the exclusion of adult volunteers including, but not limited to, managers, coaches, or any other volunteer who has direct contact with youth sports participants. And “adult” means any person 18 years of age or older. Any adult volunteer shall be disqualified from participating as a volunteer of a youth sports organization if the person has been found guilty of any one of the crimes set forth below. “Guilty” means that person was found guilty following a trial, entered a guilty plea, and entered a no contest plea accompanied by finding of guilt regardless of whether there was an adjudication of guilt or a withholding of guilt.
 - a. All sex offenses regardless of the amount of time since the offense (examples include child molestation, rape, sexual assault, sexual battery, sodomy, prostitution, solicitation, indecent exposure or similar offenses).
 - b. All felony offenses involving violence regardless of the amount of time since the offense (examples include murder, manslaughter, aggravated assault, kidnapping, robbery, aggravated burglary).
 - c. All felony offenses other than violence or sex offenses within the past ten years (examples include drug offenses, theft, embezzlement, fraud, child endangerment).

- d. All misdemeanor violence offenses within the past seven years (examples include simple assault, battery, domestic violence, hit and run).
 - e. All misdemeanor drug and alcohol offenses within the past five years or multiple offenses in the past ten years (examples include driving under the influence, simple drug possession, drunk and disorderly, public intoxication, possession of drug paraphernalia).
 - f. Any other misdemeanor within the past five years that would be considered a potential danger to children or is directly to the function of that volunteer (examples include contributing to the delinquency of a minor, providing alcohol to minor, theft – if the volunteer is to handle money).
- F) Any adult volunteer who has been charged with any of the disqualifying offenses above with cases pending court shall not be permitted to volunteer until the official adjudication of the case.
- G) The city shall require all adult volunteers to be screened for the above exclusionary criteria once a year.
- H) If the determination by the background screening entity utilized by the city is that the adult volunteer does not meet the criteria set forth herein, then the city shall provide said notice to the youth sports organization and the volunteer shall not be permitted to participate as a volunteer in any youth sports organization activity.
- I) All youth sports organizations shall comply with these requirements and shall not permit any adult volunteer who has not satisfied the exclusionary criteria to participate in violation of this section. Upon receiving results of background screenings from the city, each youth sports organization shall notify its participants of all volunteers who have been approved through the screening process.
- J) The youths ports organization shall be required to submit an affidavit on a form provided by the city certifying the organization will not use any volunteer who has direct contact with youth sports participants who has failed the background checks based upon the criteria set forth in subsection (c) above. Such affidavit shall be submitted to the Parks and Recreation Director prior to any youth sports activity.
- K) Athletic Coaches: In addition to the above requirements, all youth organizations which are independent sanctioning authorities, and which have coaches / managers who work either for compensation or as a volunteer for a youth athletic team for more than 20 or more hours within a calendar year shall provide evidence that a background check of the athletic coach has been conducted to determine whether the coach's name appears on state or federal registries of sexual predators and sexual offenders. An "independent sanctioning authority" means a private, nongovernmental entity that organizes, operates or coordinates a youth athletic team if the team includes one of more minors and is not affiliated with a private school.

ARTICLE III. BENTONVILLE LAKE

ARTICLE III. BENTONVILLE PUBLIC LAKES

Sec. 62-61. Unlawful Conduct.

The following conduct is prohibited and declared unlawful at Bentonville public lakes on and on all property surrounding the lake owned by the city:

- (1) Swimming, bathing, water skiing, aquaplaning, operation of any *motorized* boat, craft, vessel or personal watercraft including jet skis, wave jammers, water skis, aquaplanes.
- (2) Open fires (except in the barbecue pots provided by the city), littering, dumping of any refuse or trash, possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages or opened alcoholic beverage containers, overnight camping or tenting.
- (3) Firearms and explosives and any operation of motorized vehicle off access road around the lake.
- (4) Any fishing other than bank fishing. *– remove this regulation*
- (5) Any violation of state game and fish commission regulations

Description:

Title: Change name of title to reflect that the code covers the management of all lakes within operation of City Of Bentonville.

- (1) Add the term motorized to the description therefore allowing non-motorized boats such as kayaks and canoes on Bentonville public lakes.
- (4) Remove the term therefore allowing fishing from non-motorized boats in the lake.
